



## Examination Application Process

1. Applicant completes the application (reverse side) designating an exam monitor and indicating which exams are to be taken. Applicant mails application and exam fees to the AHP, allowing four weeks for exam to be received by the monitor.
2. The AHP mails the exam to the designated monitor.
3. The monitor receives the exam and finalizes arrangements with the applicant for a convenient time and place for the exam. Exams should be completed and returned as soon as possible within 6 weeks after receipt. If the exam has not been taken by then, the exam should be returned unopened.
4. The exam is sealed in an inner envelope; the monitor is not to look at the exam. The applicant breaks the seal, takes the test, and places the completed exam in the return envelope provided. The monitor signs the monitor certificate, places it in the return envelope containing the test, and mails the return envelope to the AHP.
5. The AHP grades the exam and reports the results to the applicant within four weeks. A grade of 80% or better is required to pass the exam.
6. The AHP keeps a record of which exams an applicant has successfully passed.

## Preparation for the Examination

The *Studies in Christian Statesmanship*<sup>™</sup> curriculum is designed primarily to ensure the scholastic qualifications of AHP party leaders and candidates for public office. There are four fields of study:

- Studies in Principle,
- Studies in Party,
- Studies in Leadership, and
- Studies in Public Service.

There are four levels for each field:

- Level 1 is required of all party leaders.
- Level 2 is required of all state and national party leaders and of all party nominees to county public office.
- Level 3 is required of all party nominees to state public office.
- Level 4 is required of all party nominees to federal public office.

Each field may have several subjects, with one or more textbooks or tapes per subject. The *Studies in Principle* field has seven subjects (Worldview, Law, Citizenship, Apologetics, Government, History, Nations). Texts and tapes (video and audio) are available from the AHP for self-study or group study. A study group could be an AHP Voter Club, family study, home-school support group, home Bible study group, or Sunday School class (five or more AHP members can apply to form an AHP Voter Club).

Exams generally consist of multiple-choice questions.
